2.2 Hydraulic press safety:

- The prescribed pressure must not be exceeded ✓
- Ensure the pressure gauge is in a working order ✓
- The platform on which the work piece rests must be rigid and square with the cylinder of the press ✓
- Only prescribed equipment must be used \checkmark
- Check that the securing pins for the platform are properly in place \checkmark
- Check on hydraulic pipes for leaks and/or oil on the floor \checkmark
- Bearing need to be placed in a suitable jig ✓
- The apparatus should be checked regularly if all bolts and nuts are tightened \checkmark
- The level of the hydraulic fluid in the reservoir should be checked regularly. If fluid has to be added frequently, it is an indication that there may be an internal leak. ✓
- Regularly inspect the apparatus for rigidity and tighten all nuts and bolts. \checkmark
- Pins and/or other equipment that keep the platform at a desired height on the frame must be inspected regularly for damage. \checkmark
- When the apparatus is equipped with cables to alter the working height of the platform, the cable and pulleys must be inspected for damage and lubricated with grease. √





10.2 Impulse Turbine:

- Impulse turbine changes the velocity of a water jet. \checkmark
- The jet pushes on the turbine's curved blades which changes the • direction of the flow. \checkmark
- The resulting change in momentum (impulse) causes a force on the • turbine blades. ✓
- Since the turbine is spinning the force acts through a distance and the diverted water flow is left with diminished energy. \checkmark
- Prior to hitting the turbine blades the water's pressure is converted to ٠ kinetic energy by a nozzle and focused on the turbine. \checkmark
- No pressure change occurs at the turbine blades. \checkmark •

10.3 Control of speed of steam turbine:

To prevent \checkmark the turbine rotor to reach an uncontrollable speed. \checkmark (2)

10.4 Advantages of gas turbine:

- Smooth running due to absence of reciprocating parts. \checkmark •
- Few moving parts causes less friction and wear. ✓ •
- Easy starting. ✓ •
- Can use wide range of fuels. \checkmark •
- No water cooling system required. ✓ •
- Non-poisonous gasses emitted. ✓ •
