

Case study: Dwesa and Cwebe Nature Reserve, Eastern Cape

Dwesa and Cwebe are two small nature reserves next to each other in the Eastern Cape. They protect a large area of indigenous coastal forest. The reserves also include a sensitive marine environment that has become a marine protected area. Dwesa offers a range of activities that follow conservation and eco-tourism policy, such as bird watching, game viewing and swimming. Fishing is only allowed in the areas where the rivers meet the sea.


